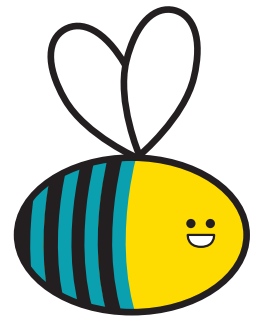


# Little EXPLORERS

## CHALLENGE

Blue-banded bee native to Queensland



Find the answers to these questions as you search through the artefacts, animals and creatures among our collections.

Explore each gallery at your own pace. Work as a family or team.

This activity is most suited to older explorers aged 4-7yrs but anyone can join in!

### Wild State – Level 4

- A. I spend my days grazing on sea grass, I am a large, grey swimming animal and am sometimes known as a “Sea Cow”. What am I? (Hint: I’m pretty big!)
- B. I am a Kangaroo, but I am found in tropical rainforests and you have to look up to see me (I don’t live on the ground like other Kangaroos). What’s my name?
- C. I am the smallest and most venomous jellyfish in the world (and THE most venomous animal in the ocean!) Can you pronounce my Indigenous name?

ANSWERS: A. Dugong / B. Tree Kangaroo / C. Irrakandji Jellyfish (Irra-CAN-gee)

### Discovery Centre – Level 4

- A. You will need to look extra hard to see me on the log, I blend so well in to my surroundings that I am sometimes easy to miss. Can you see me? What am I?
- B. There are 4 species of me inside the one glass enclosure, can you see me and my friends? What are we? (Hint: We look like twigs!) How many of us can you see?
- C. Over 100 years ago you would use me to take a photo. What am I? How do you take a photo today?

ANSWERS: A. Leaf Tail Gecko / B. Stick Insects (Phasmids) / C. Old Camera

### Wall graphics – Level 3

- A. You’ll find me crawling along the wall with two antennae and a heart on my back.
- B. The museum scientists have been hard at work describing more than how many new species?

ANSWERS: A. a Shield Bug / B. 5000

### Concourse - Level 2

- A. This was flown from England to Australia in 1929 by Bert Hinkler, his journey took 15 days. What is it? Look up!
- B. I am a giant sea creature but I have no bones, blue blood, eight arms and three hearts! I live deep down in the ocean. What am I?

ANSWERS: A. Avro Avian / B. Giant Squid

### Lost Creatures - Level 2

- A. Find the fossil skeleton of a prehistoric animal with four-legs, short tail and two big front teeth? This Megafauna is the world’s largest marsupial. (Hint: It looks like a giant wombat!) What’s its name?
- B. I am a dinosaur who lived 65 million years ago and was named after a town in central Queensland’s outback. Who am I? Can you say my name?

ANSWERS: A. Diprotodon / B. Muttaburrasaurus

### Anzac Legacy Gallery - Level 1

- A. The most prestigious award in the Australian honour system was awarded to Patrick “Paddy” Bugden in 1917 for great acts of bravery. What is it? (Hint: It’s a type of cross)
- B. I am German and I was used in WWI. I was abandoned in a shell-crater and I weigh roughly 20 tonnes. What am I?
- C. I was worn by Queensland Railways Refreshment Room staff. What am I?

ANSWERS: A. The Victoria Cross / B. Mephisto / C. Pink Uniform

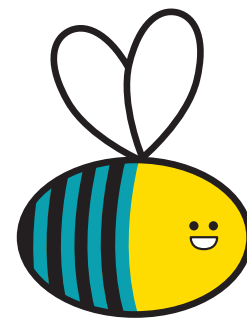
### Dinosaur Garden - Level 0

- A. My name means ‘king of the tyrant lizards’ or Tyrant King. What am I? Do you think I made a noise? What do you think I sounded like?
- B. On this plaque, you will find out when Tyrannosaurus Rex and Triceratops moved to South Bank from the Old Museum. What year was the big move?

ANSWERS: A. Tyrannosaurus Rex / B. 1986
